Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the 8th Worthing Sea Scout Group held on 13th June 2009 at 8th Worthing HQ.

PRESENT: 62

1. GSL, Ian Wetherell extended a warm welcome to everyone present at the AGM and welcomed District Commissioner Robin Strange.
2. There were apologies for absence from Mike Greenhorn, Raine Miles and Lou & Mark Scott.
3. The minutes of last year's AGM held on 28th June 2008 were approved. Proposed: Jacky Green, seconded: Deirdre Green.
4. There were no matters arising from the minutes.
5. Group Treasurer: Kevin Mullen gave his report. He thanked Kathy Shuttleworth for her help in handing over as Treasurer and Helen and Robert for their time and effort in auditing Section accounts. He also thanked Petula for taking on the Gift Aid. He referred the meeting to the accounts, which appear at the back of the booklet. The increase in training costs can be attributed to new training needs for Leaders including becoming qualified to drive a minibus and/or tow a trailer. HQ running costs include legal costs concerning the lease negotiations. The Group has been able to carry forward balances of nearly £37,000.
6. Approval was requested for the accounts. Prop: M Orpin, Sec: Barbara Wells. Carried unanimously.
7. Adoption of the Section Reports. Prop: I Wetherell, Sec: B Wells. Reports adopted.

8. Address by Group Scout Leader: Ian said that the Group had again passed its inspection and were again RN recognised. He thanked Mark & Lou and Jacky Green for all their work on the 80th Anniversary Camp. This year the Group also took part in the Remembrance Day Parade, which was a great event. He then went on to highlight various activities undertaken by the sections over the past year, full details of which appear in their written reports included in the Annual Report.

Port Beaver's programme has included a trip to High Salvington windmill as part of their Weather Badge and studied healthy eating and living and exercise. They also joined the Ilex Conservation Group to plant 500 snowdrop bulbs in Ilex Way.

Port Cubs have taken part in their annual camp at Harry's Island in the New Forest, a wonderful site with instant access to the open forest. A massed band with all the Cubs playing an instrument was another of their doubtless noisy activities.

Port Scouts went to Decoy Broad for their Summer Camp and took part in kayaking, sailing and pulling and visiting Great Yarmouth for the day. They also held a successful Outdoor Plus Challenge Camp at Broadstone Warren. They also found time to do some Indian cooking and make chocolates and pitch tents upside down.

Starboard Beavers have held a sleepover at the HQ in October and undertaken a trip to London to see the Dr Who exhibition.

Starboard Cubs have also been to Harry's Island for their camp, basing their camp on a nautical theme with the Sixes named after ships of the Royal Navy. The Cubs carried out a winter hike just before Christmas with a sleepover to follow. They have also gained 240 Activity, 79 Challenge and 4 Silver Award badges.

Starboard Scouts also went to Decoy Broad for their annual camp. They held a raft race and barbeque at Southwater Lake. They also had a demonstration of kickboxing and learnt some basic moves. They also found time to gain a massive 400 badges.

Midship Cubs took part in their annual camp at Stanford with one of the highlights being a trip to K2 with most of the Cubs getting to the top of the wall. They also enjoyed a night hike to Devil's Dyke. The Section have also gained 208 activity badges including Navigator and Entertainer.

Explorers is now one of the largest in the country. They have taken part in Sumo wrestling and in the London to Brighton cycle ride for charity.

Ian also placed on record his thanks to all the Leaders, Instructors, members of the Executive Committee, parents & friends who give so much time & effort to help & make the activities of the Group so successful.

He also thanked Jacky for all her work on the barbeque.

9. The GSL Ian Wetherell nominated Roger Green as Chairman & the nomination was carried unanimously.
10. GSL's nomination of members to the Group Executive Committee. The nomination was carried.
11. Election of
 - a) Group Secretary – Mandi Stevens
 - b) Group Treasurer – Kevin MullenIan proposed the re election of Mandi as Secretary & Kevin Mullen as the Treasurer. Proposed M Orpin, seconded P Randall. The appointments were approved.
12. Election of members of the Group Council to the Group Executive Committee:

Lawson Powell & Martin Wilton were nominated and approved.
13. Election of the Independent Financial Assessor – Mr Bryan Moon has again agreed to continue to fill this position. Proposed : M Orpin, Seconded : P Chaplain.

14. After 5 years work we now have a document for the new Lease. Steve Carleymith has been a great help because of his contact with Council members & councillors. The Council were reluctant to renew on the old terms and wanted a one year break clause. WSCC will rebuild a new HQ at no cost to us for a 1-year break clause. There was an issue at first about the area of where they will build new HQ. We have now negotiated an area between Thomas A Becket and Worthing High school. Roger then opened the floor to questions. He then gave thanks to all the Leaders and helpers particularly for help with things like the 80th Anniversary Camp.
15. Presentations: Roy Wells and Bryan McHugh have already received their Award for Merit awards. The GSL introduced Robin Strange who presented the following awards.

Wood Badges were presented to Mike Lytton, Petula Randall & Ian Stewart.

A Chief Scout's 5 Years Service Award was presented to Elaine Hammond, 10 years to Mike Orpin & James Hackett, 20 years to Jacky Green and 30 years to Ian Wetherell.

In my report to the Group, I will give a brief summary of the section reports as well as comment on the Group's activities as a whole. Full details of the section activities appear in their written reports set out in the Group Report for 2009/10.

Port Watch Beaver Scout Colony: The Beavers visited Shoreham Airport, the police helicopter taking off just before they were about to have a closer inspection. They also had a cooking evening and made "octopus" biscuits; the mind boggles!

Starboard Watch Beaver Scout Colony: Starboard Colony have held a Chinese evening for the Chinese New Year and also held an "Imagination" session where they were asked to consider how they might travel to meetings in the future.

Port Watch Cub Scout Pack: The Cubs have made cardboard Formula 1 cars and raced them. On a visit to London, the whole Pack invaded the lobby of a hotel in search of toilets, probably the highlight of the trip!

Starboard Watch Cub Scout Pack: The Pack held a uniform night and were taught how to iron their scarves and clean shoes. The pack also held a naval Quiz Night.

Midship Watch Cub Scout Pack: Midship Cubs made bird feeders and seed cakes as part of their Global Conservation Badge. They also had a visit from Trixie's Mini-Beasts with real live snakes and beetles etc.

Port Watch Scout Troop: Port Troop cleaned gravestones in St. Andrew's Churchyard as part of their Conservation badge and had a visit from the RNLI.

Starboard Watch Scout Troop: Starboard Troop had a trip to Cheddar gorge for potholing and caving. Cheese scones were cooked in cardboard ovens!

Osprey Explorer Unit: The Explorer Unit held its annual camp at Merkenveld in Belgium. A kidnap night included the arrival of a real police car, including flashing lights, whilst the Explorers tried to find out where Alex Kershaw was being held to ransom.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme: Two awards were gained this year, Lucy Hammond and Matt Proctor gained their Bronze Awards. The DofE scheme is integrated with the Explorer activity programme but involves help from members of other sections, particularly with the expeditions.

Haiti Appeal: The Group organised a bazaar in aid of the Haiti Earthquake Appeal, raising nearly £1,000. Well done everyone and thanks to Pauline Wilton for organising the event.

Scouts and Explorers attended the 100th Anniversary Parade at HMS Victory to celebrate 100 years of Sea Scouting. The Scouts were then inspected by the Second Sea Lord.

The HQ: The HQ Lease has now been renewed and this ends an unsettling period in our history. Full details are included elsewhere but I should like to thank all those involved in our campaign to obtain security for the future of Scouting in Tarring.

Thanks: Thank you everyone for your support and work during the year. Special thanks to our Chairman – Roger Green, our Treasurer – Kevin Mullen and our Secretary – Mandy Stevens.

Finally, I should like to thank my Leaders and Instructors, the members of the Executive Committee and Parents and Friends who have given so much time and effort to help and make the activities of the Group so successful.

Last year I reported on the lease negotiations and hoped they would be completed shortly after the 2009 AGM, however, it was not until the end of December that everything was eventually finalised. Although we still have the break clause in the lease there is the provision that should it be enforced then an equivalent premises would be built, at no cost to ourselves, within the Tarring area, in other words in the Group's present catchment area. It has taken a lot of time and effort, including telephone calls and e-mails, to achieve this great result, therefore, I must thank everyone involved, particularly Paul Chaplain, Steve Carleymith and all the local and county councillors, who realised that this was a very important community resource that should not be lost, but encouraged and maintained for the benefit of young people in our area. The future of the 8th is, therefore, guaranteed for the foreseeable future and this will benefit the young people and the community.

As a consequence of the new lease being granted we embarked on a policy of property improvements, starting with health and safety, security and general maintenance. The first visible signs are the new doors on the Bosun's store, the garage and the boat deck and going forward with repainting and refurbishment of the galley, etc. How far we are able to progress this year will depend on money and, above all, the time people are able to put in. We were also able to replace about 90% of all the chairs in the wardroom and cabins, free of charge, saving about £2,500 and many thanks go to Norwich Union/Aviva and Lorrie Maslen, one of our ex-parents, for arranging this. This upgrade means that the chairs now conform to current fire resistance standards.

I would like to thank all the parents that have helped during the year, especially with the annual kit checks – a tedious but necessary job. All their help is much appreciated by the Leader team. It is up to all the Leaders and parents to identify the skills required for different projects and use them accordingly in the good practice of running the Group.

My thanks also go to Kevin, our Treasurer, Mandi, our Secretary and Nikki and John for maintenance of the minibus and trailer.

As can be seen in previous paragraphs a number of ex-parents continue to help us in various ways and I think this is a very positive situation and shows they are still prepared to support the Group that gave their children so much.

Lastly I am really proud to thank all of our Leaders and personnel of all the sections for the time they freely give influencing the young people in our local area and putting a sense of community into the Group and, above all, directing, teaching and imparting skills to all these young people.

Thank you everyone and here's to another successful year to come.

I am pleased to present the Group accounts for the year to 31st March 2010, which take the form of Consolidated accounts for the Group and Sections combined, plus a breakdown of these accounts for individual Sections.

As mentioned last year, the previous style of our accounts does not meet the current requirements of the Charities Commission, so this had to be changed. However, I appreciate that the change will make it more difficult to compare this year with last year. For that reason, the attached accounts are a blend of the old and the new – whilst these accounts in the new format will be available later on the Commission website.

Despite this, there are some apparent discrepancies in these accounts to be explained. In particular, it may seem as if total

receipts and total payments have both fallen, yet most of this reflects the new treatment of subscriptions paid on, in accordance with Scout Association advice; and after making adjustments for the "one off" Anniversary Camp, receipts and (especially) payments were both slightly higher. The increased payments partly reflect the cost of works at HQ, which had been deferred due to the uncertainty during the lease negotiations, and further substantial costs are anticipated this year.

Furthermore, discussions continue to agree the precise use of the new headings in all cases; for example Port Cubs would have preferred to classify some of their "other income" as donations, instead of contributions.

Finally, my thanks go to Robert and Jacky for auditing Section accounts; to Bryan Moon for again auditing the Group accounts; to Petula for all her assistance with our Gift Aid claim; and to all Section Treasurers for their commitment week in and week out.

Southwater Lake is some 20 minutes North of Worthing and is the regular water activities site. It is not ideal for sailing due to the extensive tree cover acting as a very effective wind break. Also it is used by many people and, in addition to the Scouts, this evening there were the Sea Cadets, a canoe club, swimming club and lifesaving club all using the lake. They are currently looking for another venue, particularly for sailing, which does not involve travelling any further than now but this is proving to be difficult. It is recommended that they liaise with other Sea Scout Groups in the area, notably Lancing and Shoreham to discuss availability and use of their facilities.

The boat fleet remains the same as before and previous comments remain valid.

The inspection then moved to their HQ for the formal part of the evening. This commenced with colours conducted in a full and formal manner with a good standard of piping. Once again the number on parade was impressive and demonstrated the strength of this Group with 3 Cub Packs, 2 Scout Troops and a large Explorer Unit all present. All proved to be most smartly dressed and highly disciplined, making an impressive sight for which they are congratulated.

When spoken to, the Cubs and Scouts described a very full, active and rewarding programme of activities. Given the limited equipment and access to water they have all nevertheless experienced a range of water activities with a significant number holding the pulling badge and kayaking badges. There is a good number of challenge badges earned each year and they have a high success rate for Scouts achieving their Chief Scout Gold Award.

The Explorers are a large unit which is attached to the group. Whilst reluctant to talk about it, they also enjoy a full and active programme with a clear emphasis on kayaking as their preferred water activity. They are undertaking the DofE and Scout award

schemes with both DofE Bronze and Silver award underway in the Unit at present. When they have someone working on their Gold Award they should be aware that the RN Recognised Explorer Camp can count as their DofE residential qualification.

The Group hold regular camps and last year the Scouts summer camp was held at Decoy Broad, Norfolk whilst this year they are going to Longridge, on the Thames. The explorers are holding their summer camp in Belgium. Other camps include survival skills, outdoor and outdoor plus challenge camps and Gilwell 24.

They are also active within the District where they fare well in events and support the Gang Show. They participate in the RN Recognised events attending, with some success, the football competition.

The Group Headquarters continues to be well maintained. The recent difficulties with the Council over the lease now appear to have been resolved, with the Council keeping a short term lease but agreeing to provide the equivalent facilities, within the local area, should they decide to develop the current HQ site.

The Leadership team is very strong and experienced and provide a well structured and balanced programme to the young people. The numbers in the Group are ample evidence of the quality of both the programme and the Leaders. The Group Executive continues to provide excellent support to the Leaders and the new Treasurer has been fully integrated into the committee. Financially sound, they continue to fund themselves primarily through Subs and Gift Aid with specific projects being funded through grants and special fund raising events.

The evening closed with prayers and Evening Colours, again conducted with full and formal ceremony. The Inspecting Officer then addressed the Group, congratulating them on a good inspection before announcing that they had successfully passed this inspection and presenting the Certificate of Recognition to Mr I Wetherell, the Group Scout Leader.

This was a good inspection of a large and thriving Sea Scout Group who continue to provide a first class Scouting programme to their young people. It was good to hear that the uncertainty over their HQ has been resolved and they will now be able to move forward with confidence over their future. Smart and highly disciplined, they are fine ambassadors for the RN in Worthing and fully earn and deserve their continued RN Recognition. Well Done.



Brian Ashfield passed away on Tuesday 23rd February 2010 after a battle with cancer. He will be sorely missed by many as he was heavily involved within the 8th Worthing Sea Scouts and the Scout District and a mentor to many of the current Leaders that remain.

Brian became involved with the 8th Worthing as a Parent helper when his son Stuart joined cubs in 1972. He soon became an active member of the Group and became the Group Supporters Chairman until 1976 when he became the Venture Scout Leader and set up the first mixed sex Venture Unit in West Sussex. This was just the start of a lively career in Scouting and typical of a new approach to Scouting which was Brian's way of doing things.



In 1979 the 8th Worthing was out growing its existing Headquarters in Glebe Road and Brian was fundamental in the fundraising and

development of our current headquarters in Thomas a' Becket Middle School.

In 1984 his son Stuart, aged 20, was tragically taken in an accident whilst serving with the Royal Marines in Norway. Brian continued on within Scouting and provided the momentum for the youngsters currently in the Group at that time to develop their Nautical skills with the setting up a trust fund for training in Stuart's memory. The trust fund is still in place today providing regular funding for training and development for Leaders in nautical skills.

In 1985 he was awarded the Medal of Merit in recognition of his work. After positions as the Assistant District Commissioner for Venture Scouts and Scouts up to 1989 he then became the Assistant Group Scout Leader.

Brian supported the Worthing Scout and Guide Gang Show as the Assistant Stage Manager and making of scenery for the shows for many years until 2004 when he made full size Bill and Ben costumes for what was to be one of the funniest numbers in years. As well as the Gang Show he also supported the District Chess competition for the Cubs and numerous training courses passing on his skills.

Brian retired and became an Honorary Scouter in 1996 when he became 65. His support to the Group continued as the Group Bosun. In this position he ensured that all equipment and the Headquarters were kept in pristine condition. You could always guarantee that if anything was broken or needing replacement it was done. He drove the standards of the equipment up and set the standards for all to follow – and we did without question. It was Brian's way and it was the right way!

On St. George's Day in 2001 Brian was honoured with the Silver Acorn and this was deservedly presented to him in June 2001.

He was a Giant both in stature and in heart. He lived for Scouting and all those around him. He was dedicated to the 8th Worthing and all of its members. He will be sorely missed but very much remembered.



HQ Lease



We own our headquarters, but we lease the land it sits on and we have been in negotiation with our landlord, West Sussex County Council (WSCC), to renew our original lease which expired in August 2007. In December 2009 we finally concluded negotiations and signed a new 20 year lease.

We have corresponded with WSCC via numerous phone calls, emails, letters and meetings for over 5 years. We appointed a local solicitor, formed a sub-committee and lobbied support from local councillors. Many additional hours were volunteered to achieve a successful outcome. Thank you, on behalf of all members, to everyone who assisted in this process.

In May 2006 WSCC confirmed they were prepared to renew our lease but wanted to introduce a break clause allowing them to give us 12 months notice to vacate their site and potentially leave us homeless. We successfully argued that this was unreasonable and in December 2008 they amended their offer. Although it still included a break clause they were now prepared to fully fund an equivalent brand new building if they ever need us to move. This was great news but they had not identified an alternative site because they had no need for us to move yet. They specified a designated area for searching for sites within but this covered most of Worthing. We potentially could have ended up being located outside of our Tarring catchment area where we have been based for over 80 years. Once again we successfully argued that this was unreasonable and in March 2009 they reduced their designated area to our catchment area. In June 2009 a draft lease was drawn up and in December 2009 a final version was agreed, signed and completed.

Our new lease is now in effect. The terms are better than those of our original and the future of our Group is now secured up to 2027 when we will be planning how to celebrate our centenary.
